Seven Cornell Women and Men Honored at Cook Awards Luncheon

Awardees include staff, faculty and an undergraduate student

Seven men and women who have contributed to the advancement of women and women's issues at Cornell were celebrated at the 13th annual Constance E. Cook and Alice H. Cook Recognition Awards luncheon on April 11. Honorees for 2005-2006 included Esta Bigler, Martha Dewey, Talia Kohen '06, David Richardson, Laurel Southard, Marjolein van der Meulen and Larry Walker.

The collective contributions of the winners to improving the university climate for women are as varied and diverse as Cornell itself.

Esta Bigler, director of ILR/ NYC Extension Admin., Labor & Employment Law Office, was nominated by Samuel Bacharach, Cathy Schrier, Carolyn Jacobson and Laurie Berke-Weiss. Citing Bigler's distinguished career, Professor Emeritus Lois Gray lauded her as an "outstanding teacher" and "trailblazing pioneer," who "embodies the spirit of the Cooks."

(CITE), Martha Dewey joined Cornell in 1992. Dewey was commended by Vivian Relta for her outstanding work as a writer, creator and educator. Relta explained that Dewey's "commitment to excellence never waivers" and highlighted her "vigilance" to her craft of translating research information and the issues that impact peoples' lives into CITE scenarios. Dewey was nominated for the award by Relta and Dane Cruz, both fellow CITE colleagues.

Talia Kohen '06, one of 20 women in a class of 150 undergraduates in electrical engineering and computer science, spent last summer at the Areicibo Observatory studying aeronomy. Truly a leader, Kohen organized SFEENCS, a group of women in electrical engineering and computer science, who regularly meet with women faculty and invited guest speakers. Kohen was commended by her nominator Professor Cliff Pollock as an "activist who will help blaze a path for the future."

Serving as an electrician in Planning, Design & Construction (PDC) for a number of years, Dave Richardson now serves as PDC's first diversity recruiter with a mission to bring women

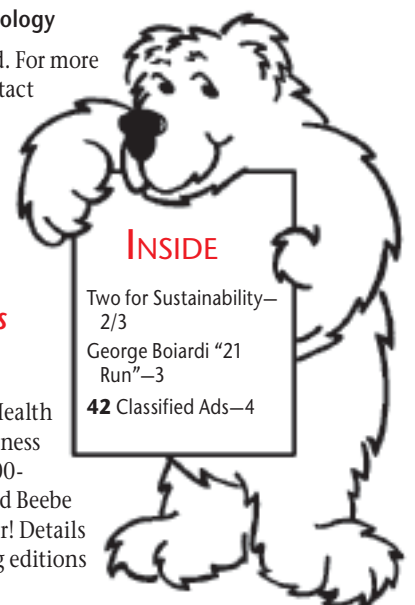

Transportation study shifts into gear and surveys university commuters

Participation of Cornell staff, faculty and students essential to study's success

University planners want to learn about the commuting needs and choices of Cornell's staff, faculty, and students as part of a major transportation study. Outcomes of the study will be used to develop strategies and options to avoid or reduce adverse transportation impacts on the surrounding area as a result of potential population growth at the university in the years ahead.

In the coming days, approximately 15,000 randomly-selected members of the Cornell community will receive surveys asking questions about their

transportation habits and needs. The results of these on-campus surveys will be tabulated in the impact statement, along with public feedback gleaned from outreach efforts with surrounding community leaders and residents.

Cornell community members who are selected to participate in the survey will receive an e-mail message with a link to an online survey. If selected, your participation is vital to obtaining an accurate assessment of the Cornell community's needs, values, and habits regarding commuting.

In return for their participation, the university will enroll those who

fill out the survey in a drawing for \$500 gift certificates, round trip tickets on the Cornell Campus-to-Campus bus service between the Ithaca campus and Manhattan, and iPods.

EC500 makes life a little easier

Do you rely on cell phones to receive important calls when you're away from your desk? Extension to Cellular (also known as EC500)

is an optional feature that lets you use your cell phone to receive calls placed to your on-campus landline phone number. People calling you no longer need to know your schedule or which phone number to use; they can always dial the same number (your office number) and you'll get the call. At this time EC500 is available to faculty and staff with local cell phone service.

Do you know?

- When someone calls your campus phone, both your campus phone and your cell phone will ring. You can answer either one.
- You turn the feature on and off to meet your needs; you can do this from your campus phone or remotely.
- The service works with any campus phone number and any campus phone model (digital or analog).
- Fees for this service are nominal: a one-time set-up cost of \$10 (which can cover up to five phones) and a monthly recurring cost of \$3 per month for digital phones and \$2 per month for analog phones.

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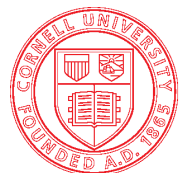

Two for Sustainability

Town and gown meet sweet at this year's Ithaca Earth Day Festival

Joey Diana Gates and Shawn Fitzgibbons, two Cornell staffers in Alumni Affairs and Development (AA&D), are using their passion for the environment and their considerable organizational talents to help further sustainability efforts through the local Center for Environmental Sustainability, which will host the Ithaca community's Earth Day celebration Sunday, April 23, at the Ithaca Farmer's Market.

After temping in PDC, Gates landed a regular Cornell position in 2004 as a reunion campaign assistant in AA&D. Her deep affection for the natural world developed early while a child playing in the woods, but her global experiences have clearly shaped environmental education. Founded in 1997, the Center

Gates, president of the Center for Environmental Sustainability, counts among the Center's core working group of individuals committed to environmental issues, an Ithaca College student, a representative from the Solid Waste Office and Patricia Haines, a Cornell doctoral student in environmental education.

for Environmental Sustainability was incorporated the following year as a not-for-profit. One of the group's successful fundraisers, which also simultaneously educates the public, is marketing the poster of the Cayuga basin bioregion watershed. The poster, selling for \$15.00, is available at the Plantations gift shop and the Lab of Ornithology.

First celebrated in 1970, Earth Day brings together a wide range of people from different parts of the community. "It's a great example of town/gown cooperation," says Gates. "Many Cornell employees are involved in either tabling or volunteering and we have a number of Cornell students groups, like the Solar Decathlon Team and Engineers for a Sustainable World, are exhibiting."

"The issue movement of sustainability is inspiring people," Gates continues. "Just look at the 130 entries for the Re-Imagine Fashion Show, a highlight of our Earth Day celebration. As people see gas prices go up, sustainability as a movement picks up steam."

Although a relative newcomer to the Center for Environmental Sustainability, Shawn Fitzgibbons, an individual giving officer in special gifts, is a veteran in environmental issues. Immediately before coming to Cornell, Fitzgibbons spent nearly four years as director of corporate programs with the EarthWatch Institute in Boston. EarthWatch plans learning experiences

around the globe where lay volunteers accompany and help professional scientists conduct valuable scientific research,

and in the process, volunteers are exposed to environmental issues. At EarthWatch, Fitzgibbons was responsible for partnerships at the corporate level. Serendipitously, a special partnership that he spearheaded between EarthWatch and Starbucks will feature among the promotions accompanying the opening of Ithaca's first Starbucks coffee shop-located in the same downtown building as his office.

10 percent In just four years. PDC Director John Kiefer summed up Richardson, who was nominated by Judy Barrett-Acosta, as "a pretty amazing guy."

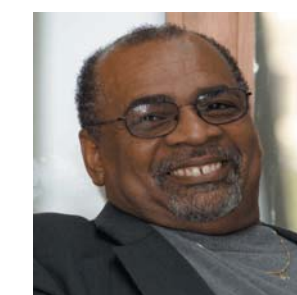

Cited for her enthusiasm and energy in encouraging and mentoring female students in biology, Southard, who has a wide range of coordinating responsibilities, was summed up as a combination "den mother," "queen" and "the goddess of undergraduate research."

Marjolein van der Meulen, associate professor in Mechanical & Aerospace Engineering, has been on university faculty for 10 years. Nominated by Professors Paulette Clancy and Christine Shoemaker, van der Meulen was described as a "natural leader" and commended for her efforts to increase diversity in the physical sciences and engineering. 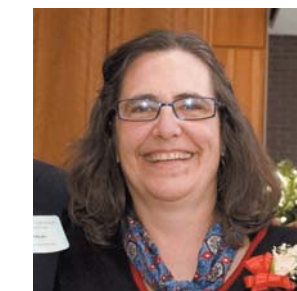
